After Worship Coffee Time Conversation July 9, 16, 23 & 30th

After worship each Sunday in July, grab a cup of coffee and join the conversation with others about our four areas of ministry: Community Ministry, Worship and Music, Pastoral Care, and Intergenerational Ministry. Come to one, more, or all four! At our meeting on June 18th the congregation received a draft Ministry Plan. This was developed through the compilation efforts of the Ministry Planning Team, building on the efforts of many contributors. The Team felt the plan needed a look from the perspective of each of our four core areas of ministry. Further fine tuning would involve further input from Reframe on opportunities in West Kelowna. The final document will be presented first to the congregation and then to the Pacific Mountain Region for approval and will also point to the kind of resources we will need to carry it out. Building(s) will be part of that plan.

We will have four meetings after church in July. Each will focus on a specific area of ministry and will be available to attend via our regular worship Zoom link. The meetings are meant to comment on and expand the draft Ministry Plan.

We will consider whether or not the draft plan captured the ministry:

- ·as it is
- ·as we dream it could be
- in the resources it needs
- ·in its potential partnerships


Planned Giving

Water Collecting Over Summer

Summer is a time when our church community looks a bit different. People are away on holidays and travelling. People have guests and visitors and so don't make it to church every Sunday. Attendance on Sundays may be lower. And we may have guests and newcomers too! In looking ahead to the Fall and regathering once the summer is over and school has resumed, we had the idea of a little project to keep us connected. We invite you to take a bottle (or any container will do) to collect water while you are on holidays—from a lake, stream, hot springs, even the West Edmonton Mall pool (Noah Chiasson's idea)! Bring these back in September for a special intergenerational service on September 10th.





Tuesday Outreach continues to grow in numbers as more people join us for a meal and to get some groceries. Demand varies each week and often gets heavier near each month end. On one Tuesday last month we handed out 63 bags of groceries and served about 70 meals, another new record for us.

While it is rewarding to see how this Outreach is filling a need and how greatly appreciated it is by the various members of the community (the homeless, those in transitional housing, or those who have a place to live but not enough money to afford groceries), it is at the same time often a very humbling experience for the volunteers.

It is on a Tuesday morning when you realize just how blessed you are to have everything you need to live a comfortable life: a safe home, a comfortable bed, healthy and delicious food, clean clothing, and family and friends surrounding you.

Our guests on a Tuesday morning may have some of those things but not all of them, or they may have none of what we take for granted. Their lives are so very different than ours and it is hard to imagine what they experience. One young man was thanking me a couple of weeks ago for his lunch and commented that it was the first meal he had eaten in almost a week.

As you count your many blessings and think of those in our community who are less fortunate, know that all donations to Outreach are greatly appreciated. As grocery prices continue to rise, what we really need are donations of the non-perishable foods noted below. If you can help in any way, your generosity would be greatly appreciated.

We have changed our processes slightly to keep costs down and to ensure everyone gets something and we do not run out before the last folks arrive. We now give out 8 items instead of 10, with 2 of their choices come from the meat/protein options while the other 6 choices come from the rest of our options.

Meat/Protein: canned tuna, chicken, ham, pork & beans, chili, Chef Boyardee; and peanut butter
Other Items: canned soup, vegetables, fruit; boxes of cereal; individual-serving oatmeal packets; pasta and pasta sauces; Mac & Cheese; Mr. Noodle; Premium Saltine Crackers; individual fruit cups; granola bars; coffee and brown and white sugar (we split the larger containers into smaller lots for distribution); and toilet paper
Pop and juice boxes for lunches would also be appreciated, and sandwiches and cookies are always welcome.

Dear Friends, "The Peace of Christ Be With You All"

Several of our New Testament professors told us Paul always started his letters that way because, in his day, it was far more common (and socially acceptable) to begin by calling on the "Peace of Rome" or the "Peace of the Emperor" in opening statements. Paul, we were told, was actually being quite subversive in his opening blessings. Initially I interpreted that as Paul's bravery in the face of power, explaining why the forces of the Empire imprisoned him and others who also espoused the ascendance of God and Jesus over Rome. Now I think I may have been too narrow in my focus.

I think Paul truly saw a God-informed, Christ-assured, Spirit-led, Way of life and living that was entirely contrary to the established norms of his time. People, faced with the social issues of their day might have groaned heavily beneath loads imposed upon them by the power and might of the Emperor's Peace, saying things like "Well, it's always been this way" or "What's to be done about it? Can't change Rome..." Paul was, in his way saying "Really? Have you heard the good news? There is, totally, another Way!"

That's how I like to think about Tuesdays in the Church Hall. Another Way. A Way that offers welcome, service, food and a momentary citizenship of grace to friends and companions who have been forgotten by the Empire we live in. Rome, in our time, has taken their measure, found them valueless except as excuses for expenditures in policing, social service worker funding and by-law enforcement staffing and cast them to the side of whatever nook or cranny that might be temporarily acceptable.

For a few moments, between nine and noon on Tuesday mornings, people marginalized and traumatized by Empire can find themselves beloved, can find themselves sharing a meal served by loving hands, can find themselves gifted with food offered by loving hearts, can find themselves afforded space and time and some degree of dignity.

These days many more people are falling off the edges of Empire. Numbers of guests have increased from around 20 to (last Tuesday) at least 70, with 63 bags of groceries given out. So far, thanks to the generosity of folk like you, we've had enough food for the meal and enough groceries for the bags. We're determined to keep on trying to meet the needs as best we can, although limiting some of what's available as we stretch to meet them. Your gifts are so appreciated as you join in with Paul and announce the Peace of Christ. Another Way continues to subvert the Empire's way of devaluing life and those who live it.

Dear Board Members,

Re: Dog Pound Impound Fee Policy

I am writing with respect to this policy and the effect it has on people living without housing in our community. Anecdotal conversations with staff at the pound indicate that a number of people living without housing have had to bail their dogs out of the pound under the terms of the policy's ever escalating impound fee system.

In one specific case our church has twice supported the release of a person's dog, helping cover the majority of a \$185.00 bill (\$65.00 the first time and \$100.00 of \$120.00 the second). We cannot sustain this as it comes out of our rapidly growing food support budget (our numbers have tripled in recent weeks and are not slowing down).

Should the fees continue without some sort of compassion policy we will be faced with a system that impounds the pets of people already on their last emotional legs, many of whom are simply economically unable to sustain housing in our rental market. We will, of course, care for, house, feed and adopt out their pets to people more able to keep them fenced in or housed, while continuing to watch helplessly as the people they were family to live at the side of the road and gradually dwindle out of existence. Dwindling even more rapidly as we take what little they have in order to release their companions back to them.

I believe we, through you, can come up with a compassionate policy that allows by-law enforcement staff more latitude when dealing with the pets of people living without housing. I know there will always be some folk (housed or not) who are not fit guardians for pets and believe our staff are capable of discerning those situations. There are others, however, who are living without housing through no fault of their own. Neither they nor their pets should have to undergo separation and deprivation because of the circumstances forced upon them by the current state of the housing market in our area.

Please do what you can to help people living in poverty reconnect with their source of love and the heart of their affection. Thank you for taking the time to consider this request.

To begin with, my life in Kelowna began in 2005, in an attempt at improved health, and to sate wanderlust, St. Paul's United Church being a stone's throw from where my wife, Shirley and I live, was an easy first choice for Sunday worship. Although I attended worship services, I wasn't an enthusiastic volunteer. Honestly, private tutoring took president over volunteering. Yes, I served in the kitchen sometimes, was one of the usher/greeter team, became a Board member of St. Paul's Foundation, However, in 2016 there was a dramatic change in St. Paul's congregational life. I then became more engaged and volunteered to serve on the newly elected Board of Trustees.

At the time of Amalgamation in 2021, I had been Chair of St. Paul's Board of Trustees for five years during which I represented the congregation in negotiating rental of space agreements at two different Churches, drafting a Statement of Investments Policy; interviewing and selecting the current Investment Management Company; serving on the Ministry Profile and Search Committee in hiring Reverend Ivy Thomas. One might say I kinda transitioned into my current role as Chair of the Property Maintenance Team. Albeit, not necessarily by intent, mind you!

Doubts and concerns aside, in many ways I am happy I volunteered for the position. One reason is, that I had the good fortune to become a part of like-minded volunteers who have shown their dedication to carry out a primary duty of care, that is, to ensure a safe healthy environment for all who visit, volunteer, work, and assemble at the respective Sites.

Our Team's focus has primarily been on 721 Bernard Avenue building, not by design, but out of necessity. All due respect to the venerable building, it has posed some challenging critical moments, and at great cost. The Team has had to contend with, mid-winter snow, ice, and water damages, two fires, a section of the Sanctuary ceiling collapse and associated risk of contamination, furnace outages and new install, roof damage and repair, rodent infestation (no locusts, yet), faulty outdated Fire Alarm and Security systems; faulty outdated telephone system, faulty plumbing infrastructure, and most recently the parking lot sinkhole.



It might be said our Team provided the lubricant that kept the building operable (pardon the metaphor); and continues to do so.

As you can imagine, it takes a total Team effort, diligence, resilience, attention to detail; and most importantly, a deep sense of responsibility and commitment to carry out our duty of care; often under trying circumstances.

I feel blessed to be a member of such an experienced, knowledgeable, collaborative, and cooperative Team: Ted Basisty, Ross Hyatt, Drew Irvine, Ernie Park, Murray White, and Saibun Hasibuan (Properties Administrator). Just so you know, collectively, the Property Maintenance Team represents at least 175 years of volunteer service to the United Church. Needless to say, Duty of care is the Team's raison d'efre.

Has it been frustrating? Yes. Has it been challenging? Yes. Has it been rewarding, and worthwhile? Yes!

I believe we are evolving into a "United" Church, and all that this implies. As well, I strongly believe time is of the essence, and the time is now!


