Not in Our Name?

November brings with it memories of cenotaphs and poppies. Stories of grandfathers eaten by the monster that rises up in human psyche, consuming all in its ravenous maw. Placing my red flowers, one for Dad's dad, one for Mom's. Gassed at Vimy, drowned in the Aegean. Giving health and life in defense of ours.

In school I learned they fought for peace. I wear a peace poppy in token of that. Bled white in their memory. My mother's memories are steeped in bombs falling, cities destroyed, civilian populations erased in the name of retribution and rage. When I became a minister one of those I ministered to, my friend Jack, a bomber navigator in the last days of the war, wept in memory of the cities he'd helped erase, the lives he'd taken, the targets he'd helped incinerate. They were toured around the remains after hostilities had ceased. I don't think they ever ceased for him.


I think of today's young Israeli pilots, targeting apartment buildings, schools, hospitals, streets and shelters. Seeking to eradicate the enemy. Young Russian soldiers, young Ukrainian freedom fighters, young Palestinians fighting for their homeland. What will each of them come to live with? Will they weep with Jack? Will the thousands upon thousands incinerated by their direct action come to them in their dreams? Haunt their memories?

Noam Chomsky, a Jewish American analyst of empire and the unconscious agreements that sustain its power asks us, in Ukraine and Palestine, in Africa and the Americas, to just follow the money.

"Who is enriched," he asks, "by the pursuit of war?"

Who is enriched in Palestine and Israel? Who holds the prize in the Ukraine, in Russia and America? Who profits by the armed destruction of a people, a place, a way of being? Who haunts the ruins to loot the remnants of the cindered lives? Who wins the next election? Who's stock soars on sales of armaments? Who controls wheat futures and oil reserves? One could say it's the billionaires, but then there's the Canada Pension Plan...

Not in our name?

Roots of Conflict with Keith Simmonds

Keith Simmonds spent two months in Bethlehem in early 2020 as a human rights observer for the World Council of Churches. A United Church of Canada Minister, well versed in the history, past and present of the Occupation of Palestine, he will join us on Sunday, October 22, after worship, to speak about the roots of the Palestine/Israel conflict. He will expand on that theme in a four-part series (Wednesdays at 5 pm) beginning November 1st that will consider history, trauma, anti-Semitism, Colonialism, the politics of Empire, and the present-day plight of ordinary citizens of Palestine and Israel.

We will be digging deep within the roots of conflicts between Israel and Palestine.

Join him for any or all of these weekly study sessions on the deep roots of conflict and meet on Wednesdays (Nov 1, Nov 8, Nov 15 and Nov 22) at 5:00 PM.

PEACE POPPIES?

WHITE POPPIES FOR PEACE MADE THEIR FIRST APPEARANCE IN GREAT BRITAIN, GROWING OUT OF THE CONCERNS OF MOTHERS, SISTERS AND WIVES OF MEN WHO WERE KILLED IN WORLD WAR ONE. CAMPAIGNS TO SELL THEM AS A STATEMENT AGAINST WAR BEGAN IN EARNEST IN 1934. SINCE THAT TIME MILLIONS UPON MILLIONS OF PEOPLE HAVE DIED IN WAR, MOST OF THEM NON-COMBATANTS. IN LATTER DAYS ENVIRONMENTALLY DESTRUCTIVE MECHANISMS HAVE BEEN ADDED TO ARSENALS, FROM NUCLEAR BOMBS TO DEFOLIANTS TO THE DENIAL OF IRRIGATION, DRINKING WATER, FOOD, WASTE SYSTEMS AND HEALTH CARE.

THIS YEAR, AS ENEMIES, WHETHER 'FREEDOM FIGHTERS', 'TERRORISTS' OR WELL ARMED STATE MILITARY OUTDO ONE ANOTHER IN HORRIBLE BRUTALITY INFLICTED UPON INNOCENTS FROM RUSSIA TO UKRAINE TO ISRAEL TO PALESTINE, WITH MANY 'SMALLER' CONFLICTS IN BETWEEN, WE NEED THE WHITE POPPY MORE THAN EVER. AS MY MOTHER, WHOSE FATHER WAS KILLED IN WORLD WAR TWO SAYS, "I WEAR THE RED POPPY BECAUSE OF ALL THE BLOOD THAT WAS SHED. I WEAR THE WHITE ONE THAT IT MAY NEVER BE SHED AGAIN."

THE WHITE POPPIES IN OUR OFFICE CAME FROM ENGLAND VIA SOME HELPING HANDS IN VANCOUVER. THEY ARE AVAILABLE FOR SALE BY DONATION AS LONG AS SUPPLIES LAST. PLEASE CONSIDER BECOMING A SIGN OF PEACE IN A WORLD THAT HAS BLED ENOUGH.

How do we respond to that which we do not understand today? Donald continues exploring homosexuality and the Bible in a study taking place on Monday nights at 7pm. All are welcome.

November 20th Is The Transgendered Day Of Remembrance

It is the day the Transgendered Community of the world remembers those in our community whose lives were cut short by violence... by MURDER. It is the tradition to speak the names of the dead out loud on November 20th, but the official number of people we lost between October 1, 2021 to September 30, 2022 is 327. The year before, that number was 375.

There are many countries that don't even keep track of our dead, let alone those in our community who were murdered, so the official number does not reflect the totality of our losses. How do you quantify what the loss of this many people means? It is impossible.

The transgendered community includes people from all walks of life. They were valued for who they were and what they did for each other and the broader world they lived in. They were a diverse bunch... who knows what they could have accomplished in future years? We will never know.

The following information comes from the www.TGEU.org Trans Murder Monitoring Project's 2022 report:

"Most of the victims were trans women or femmes. A majority of the victims (65%) were people of colour, and almost half (48%) were known to be sex workers. In Europe, 36% of the victims were migrants.

According to the figures, most of the victims murdered were aged between 31 and 40."

We live in a world in turmoil. Violence is all around us. It is almost too much to contend with. On November 20th, I remember those lost in my transgendered community. I feel the weight of each loss.

Celebrating Youth Resiliency from Haida Gwaii to Kelowna: Promoting Health Through Culture

Read the following article from Philippa Putlitz (Upstream Coordinator; BGC Okanagan)

On November 19th, 2023, Upstream Kelowna will collaborate with Central Okanagan United Church (COUC) Community Ministry to celebrate youth and family engagement in culture and recreation. Inspired by Debbie Hubbard and Dean Reidt's trip to Haida Gwaii, COUC reached out to BGC Okanagan (BGCO; lead organization of Upstream Kelowna) and Ki-Low-Na Friendship Society (KFS- partnering agency) to showcase our community's efforts to involve young people in cultural activities as a means of enhancing resiliency.

What is Upstream Kelowna?

Upstream Kelowna is a local adaptation of Upstream Canada (a project of The Canadian Observatory on Homelessness and A Way Home Canada). This innovative approach to prevention and early intervention uses a confidential and school-based universal screening tool to identify barriers to resilience; and thereby wraps supports around students and their families to enhance their well-being, stabilize housing, improve school experience and ultimately – to thrive.

Barriers Faced by Youth & Families

- Low income
- Mental Health
- Housing instability
- Generational trauma

Upstream Kelowna Impact and Partners

- Identified and served over 170 youth and families to date.
- Upstream projects to connect over 115 more youth and families to wrap around supports by March 31st, 2024.
- Services provided include but are not limited to family mediation, life skills support, academic support, employment support, mentorship, counseling, therapy, systems navigation as well as access to recreation and culture.
- Group programming includes social emotional learning through book clubs, youth fitness programs, equine therapy, family cooking programs, land-based learning, tutoring support and more.
- Partners with Upstream
 - BGC Okanagan
 - Ki-Low-Na Friendship Society
 - The Bridge Youth and Family Services
 - Arc Youth and Family Programs
 - CMHA's Foundry
 - YMCA-SIBC
 - Central Okanagan Public Schools

Equity and Belonging

For Indigenous populations, the experience of being homeless can come from cultural, spiritual, and emotional perspectives, as well as the more evident perspective of sheer housing instability and homelessness. The need to see themselves in their schools, their community, and their support and to celebrate their cultural identity within themselves is a basic need with direct links to health outcomes.

By identifying youth flying under the radar, checking in at schools, and offering an opportunity for connection, 47% of Upstream participants have identified as Indigenous – and several not only accessed cultural activities for the first time, but also discovered their Indigeneity. In Canada today, a staggeringly disproportionate rate of Indigenous youth experience homelessness and over 45% of these had their first experience of homelessness before the age of sixteen¹.

Ki-Low-Na Friendship (KFS) Society has worked with nearly half of all Upstream participants. They connected them to youth groups, arts, cultural events, Indigenous leadership opportunities, land-based learning, and more. KFS has set an example for all other partnering agencies in demonstrating the power of community and family work.

Community Ministry

Tuesday Morning Coffee, Social Time, Meal and Grocery Distribution

We have become aware that Community Ministry and Outreach at COUC is not well understood so I am going to try and explain at least a part of it in this newsletter entry. Community Ministry includes many different groups and activities that fall into the three areas of Outreach, Education and Social Justice.

What we commonly refer to as Outreach – our “Tuesday Morning Coffee, Social Time, Meal and Grocery Distribution” – is just one part of all the Outreach that COUC does both in its local community and in places further afield such as our COUC programs of support for Palestine and El Salvador and our work with refugees through the Central Okanagan Refugee Committee (CORC).

As a result, we are looking for a new name for what we do on Tuesday mornings. Hopefully the name will not be as long as “Tuesday Morning Coffee, Social Time, Meal and Grocery Distribution,” but it will be something that reflects what we do every week when we open our doors.

While we sort out the terminology, our Tuesday mornings will continue. October was a busy month with a full turkey Thanksgiving meal for our guests on October 10th and other hot meals such as hamburger soup, KFC, roasted potatoes and sausage, and chili and cornbread on other Tuesdays. We are also very thankful for the new volunteers who have come forward to help us!

The Food Pantry continues to be busy and our grocery shoppers are strengthening their muscles hefting case after case of canned goods and other non-perishable items. And we are so grateful for all of your support and the many grocery donations that we receive each week. These donations allow us to fill all orders that are placed and we could not do our grocery distribution without you.
